Message From Rabbi

Leaders of the Jewish People



The Torah portion for this week, Shelach Lecha, tells the story of the leaders of the twelve tribes who were sent to spy out the Land of Israel. The text provides a list of names of these tribal leaders.

This is the second time in the Book of Numbers where we find a list of tribal leaders. Earlier, at the very beginning of the Book of Numbers, the Torah provides a list of the tribal leaders who will assist Moses and Aaron with the census.

The list of the spies is not the same as the list of census takers. Why is this? One would expect the leaders of the tribes in Chapter One of the Book of Numbers would still be leading their tribes in Chapter Thirteen. But they're not, the lists are completely different. There is no overlap at all.

There in Chapter One, they are called "leaders of their father's house." Here in Chapter Thirteen they are called "chieftains" and "leaders of the Israelites." The tasks the two groups of leaders are asked to perform are quite different. In Chapter One, the task is simple and straight forward: all the leaders have to do is count the males of their tribe who are of age for military service. In Chapter Thirteen the task is more important and more complicated. Here Moses instructs them to tour the land in order to determine the nature of the land and its inhabitants.

In Chapter One they are called "leaders of their father's house." This suggests they have their position because of their family connections. In Chicago we would call these patronage jobs.

Here in Chapter Thirteen the text describes them not as "leaders of their father's house" but rather "leaders of the Israelites." One can imagine that these leaders have earned the respect of the Israelites. Here Moses relies on merit selection.

None of the twelve census takers from Chapter One are ever mentioned again in the Torah. Two of the spies, Joshua and Caleb, play important ongoing roles in the saga of our people.

Kabbalat Shabbat Service, July 4th

On Friday July 4th we will join in Shabbat worship at a special time, 6:30 PM, with a Kabbalat Shabbat Service. Kabbalat Shabbat means greeting or receiving the Sabbath. The service will be shorter than our regular Friday evening services. We anticipate that the service will conclude about 7:15 PM. This earlier service allows us to enjoy a leisurely Shabbat dinner following the service in the traditional manner and celebrate the 232nd anniversary of our nation's independence.

Walk With Israel

On a comfortably sunny Sunday, May 4th, several adult and young members of Etz Chaim gathered at McCormick Place to participate in the Israel Solidarity Walk. Festivities began with a rally, where a number of dignitaries and event organizers spoke in support of the State of Israel and its relationship with the United States. The money raised from the participants of the 6K walk will be used to support a camp run by Youth Futures, “a program operating in and around Sderot, which breaks the cycle of poverty and stress. The camp isn’t just for kids in the region; it’s for whole families. It’s a place where parents and children can spend time together, building their relationship and trust, and learning, with the help of trained staff, how to cope. It’s also a place where they can relax for a while and enjoy themselves, away from the danger.”

Following the Walk, participants were able to purchase lunch at one of several Kosher vendors and enjoy hours of entertainment provided by Israeli musicians. Each participant received a T-shirt commemorating the event, and whoever raised at least \$100, earned a voucher which may be used by him/herself or given to anyone ages 15-23 going to Israel with SKIP or a similar approved program. A very worthwhile, meaningful and fun-filled day!

Congregational Retreat; A View From a Participant

When we signed up for the Retreat at OSRUI, we weren't sure what to expect. Our motivations for going were mostly to have a nice peaceful weekend away and to expose our children to the camp so they could be more comfortable with going there in a year or two when they felt ready. We hoped that the kids would have some fun and that we'd get to know some people on a deeper level than you can achieve at the Sunday tumbler or after services. When we got the agenda, we were a little alarmed that there would be singing at every meal and that there would be four services in less than 48 hours. We discovered that our hopes were very easily fulfilled and that our fears were completely misplaced and that the singing and services were a truly enjoyable way to have a restful and introspective Shabbat.

We arrived Friday evening, a bit late for dinner, having discovered that the Northwest suburb route was pretty slow during rush hour, but the staff at OSRUI very kindly brought out the whole Shabbat meal for us to enjoy while the rest of the group sang songs. Given our rushed entrance, Shabbat services seemed similar to those we've had at the synagogue and then we had to miss the evening adult event because our children wanted to stay with us instead of with the other children. Saturday, we were better able to get ourselves in the Shabbat mood, and began to really understand what the retreat was all about. Both children asked if they could sleep with the "big kids" as they already felt very comfortable. We suddenly felt the intimacy and pace of the services much better. The afternoon events revolved around two chugs, or special interest groups, that we had selected. Both were geared toward more fully exploring ways to connect with God, in our case, through nature and music. The chugs were very well structured and both adults and the kids enjoyed them. The singing at the meals suddenly seemed like a great way to enjoy a day and do something fun with friends. We had a couple of hours in the afternoon to spend time with our kids with no outside distractions and we all seemed to enjoy it more than we would have at home. All too soon, Shabbat was over, but we were yet even more engaged at the evening Havdallah service. After some more songs around the campfire, we retired to a great night's sleep. A few more activities on Sunday morning, including perhaps the most intimate and engaging service I've been involved with and it was time to head home. Our youngest sang his new songs the whole way home.

We're very much looking forward to next year's retreat. It's a great way to step out of your daily life, think more about your relationship with God and your fellow synagogue members. Our oldest already wants to go to OSRUI next summer, so our simple objective was easily met. The real lesson we learned was that we have to learn how to set aside our daily diversions and distractions so we don't have to wait another year to truly enjoy another Shabbat. We highly recommend the retreat and hope you can make the same discovery yourself.

Please do not bring books to the Etz Chaim library unless previous arrangements with the library chair have been made. Thank you.

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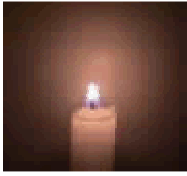
